Local and Regional Project Assistance Grants (RAISE)

Department of Transportation / Office of the Secretary Application Due Date: February 28, 2023

The RAISE program provides supplemental funding for grants to the State and local entities listed above on a competitive basis for projects that will have a significant local/regional impact.

Applications for \$1.5 billion of FY 2023 funding are being accepted through February 28, 2023. Grants will range in size from a minimum of \$5,000,000 in urban areas (\$1,000,000 in rural areas) to a maximum of \$25,000,000. Funds will be equally distributed between rural and urban projects.

FTA 5339(b) Program - Bus and Bus Facilities Competitive Grants

Department of Transportation / Federal Transit Administration Application Due Date: April 13, 2023

Provides capital funding to replace, rehabilitate, purchase, or lease buses and bus related equipment and to rehabilitate, purchase, construct, or lease bus-related facilities.

Applications for \$469 million of FY 2023 funding are being accepted through April 13. This is a combined NOFO with the FTA 5339(c) Low or No Emission Grant program.

FTA 5339(c) Program - Low or No Emission (Bus) Grants

Department of Transportation / Federal Transit Administration Application Due Date: April 13, 2023

Provides capital funding to replace, rehabilitate, purchase, or lease buses and bus related equipment and to rehabilitate, purchase, construct, or lease bus-related facilities. Provides capital funding for low or no emissions bus projects.

Applications for \$1.22 billion of FY 2023 funding are being accepted through April 13. This is a combined NOFO with the FTA 5339(b) Bus and Bus Facilities Program.

Charging & Fueling Infrastructure Grants (Corridor Charging)

Department of Transportation / Federal Highway Administration

Deploy electric vehicle (EV) charging and hydrogen/propane/natural gas fueling infrastructure along designated alternative fuel corridors and in communities. The program has a total of \$1,250,000,000 of federal funding available over the timeframe of IIJA.

Charging & Fueling Infrastructure Grants (Community Charging)

Department of Transportation / Federal Highway Administration

Program funds will be made available each fiscal year for Community Grants, to install EV charging and alternative fuel in locations on public roads, schools, parks, and in publicly accessible parking facilities. These grants will be prioritized for rural areas, low-and moderate-income neighborhoods, and communities with low ratios of private parking, or high ratios of multiunit dwellings. The program has a total of \$1,250,000,000 of federal funding available over the timeframe of IIJA.





FY 2022 Safe Streets and Roads for All Program Awards (Atlanta Region)

Central and Pryor Safe Streets Corridors

Applicant: City of Atlanta Atlanta, Georgia

SS4A Award: \$30,000,000

Project Description

This project will transform Pryor Street and Central Avenue in Atlanta, Georgia, to safe streets with protected bike and pedestrian facilities, and connect the Southside of Atlanta and the Southside Beltline trail to Atlanta's downtown.

The project will implement <u>Proven Safety Countermeasures</u> such as rectangular rapidflashing beacons, pedestrian hybrid beacons, bicycle lanes, crosswalk lighting, roadway



reconfiguration, medians, safe speed limits, edge lines, and enhanced delineation for horizontal curves at crash hot spots on the City's high-injury network.

There are currently no other built bicycle facilities that run north and south through downtown, so this project will be a major expansion of the current system and bike network. The addition of protected on-street bike facilities along with improved and connected pedestrian facilities will enhance safety and promote mode shift from single occupancy vehicles to more active transportation modes.

FY 2022 National Infrastructure Project Assistance (Mega) Program

Roosevelt Boulevard Multimodal Project

City of Philadelphia Philadelphia, PA

AWARD TOTAL: \$78,000,000

Quick hits:

- The project: The project will make improvements along approximately 12.3 miles
 of Roosevelt Boulevard, from North Broad Street to the Bucks County line.
 Improvements include traffic signal upgrades, reconfiguring intersections and
 roadways, constructing median barriers and pedestrian refuge islands, corridor access
 management improvements, and complete streets improvements for accessibility,
 pedestrian, and bicycle improvements. It will also create new business access and
 transit lanes.
- Economic benefits: The project will aim to help enhance the region's economic competitiveness by promoting local hiring and job creation, creating workforce opportunities for historically underrepresented groups, expanding affordable transportation option for disadvantaged communities, improving access to non-motorized travelers, and improving transportation efficiency through reduced congestion in the region.
- Economic importance: Many Philadelphians depend on Roosevelt Boulevard to access jobs and daily services, but face challenges in safety, accessibility, and congestion, no matter how they travel. The corridor serves ten Southeastern Pennsylvania Transit Authority (SEPTA) transit routes and as many as 25,000 bus riders per day on over 28 bus routes. Freight and delivery services along the Boulevard are critical for both the corridor's and region's economic well-being.
- Safety benefits: Today, Roosevelt Boulevard has one of the highest rates of crashes in Philadelphia, accounting for 14 percent of all crash-related fatalities in the city, according to the application. The project will improve transportation safety for all modes of travel along the Boulevard with the goal of reducing the number of traffic fatalities to zero. According to the project sponsor, improvements to pedestrian and cyclist infrastructure are expected to deliver a crash risk reduction of 31%.
- Resilience benefits: The project will improve sustainable transportation infrastructure for walking, transit riders, and cycling, allowing residents and commuters to make choices minimizing environmental impacts. The improved corridor will provide benefits from reduced air pollution, benefiting disadvantaged communities near the project area.
- Equity and quality of life benefits: Proactively addressing racial equity and other disparities is a fundamental premise of the project, and it will greatly improve multimodal and transit access across disadvantaged neighborhoods.

- Federal contributions range from \$30 million to \$292 million
