Salondia relocated to Savannah, GA in August of 1997, began teaching at Maxine Patterson's

School of Dance and became a member of Sankofa Dance Theatre.

As a professional dancer she has had the privilege to work with the "Jazz Master" Gus Giordano, Susan & Michael Quinn, Leon Von Brown, Marcus Alford & Annie Day, James Yarborough, Kris Cangelosi, Dawn and Ajile Axam, Carol Bristol, Kevin Veiga, Kevin lega Jeff, and other world-renowned choreographers. Salondia studied traditional West African Dance in Senegal, West Africa.
