RC's Workforce Solutions Division focuses on demand-driven workforce solutions by providing Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) services for dislocated workers, unemployed and low-income adults and youth, as well as providing data and resources for businesses seeking a skilled workforce. This summary of activities from the past program year - July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2016 reflects the impact on workforce efforts in our service area of Cherokee, Clayton, Douglas, Fayette, Gwinnett, Henry and Rockdale counties.

The network of Career Resource Centers worked with 38,603 local residents during Program Year 2015. Individuals received individualized career services such as job search, resume preparation, computer literacy, JobSmart, LinkedIn and resume workshops, career counseling and comprehensive evaluations.

new customers were enrolled into WIOA Services.

customers were enrolled into training programs.

customers that were enrolled in the current or previous program year(s), completed their training programs and attained credentials.

customers were employed after training with an average starting wage of \$18.75.

customers used the computer labs at the Career Resource Centers.

customers attended resume writing workshops and 2,111 customers attended JobSmart Workshops at the Career Resource Centers.

individuals visited the Mobile Career Unit. The Mobile Unit provided outreach into all seven counties with regularly scheduled dates and times at 12 local libraries as well as numerous local events such as job fairs, rapid response and veteran outreach events.

people attended 39 business recruitment events. Workforce Solutions staff continue to develop, expand and implement work-based learning programs such as on-the-job-training, internships, apprenticeships, and incumbent worker training and workplace fundamentals.

Youth Service providers served the seven counties with a strong emphasis on service to high school dropouts, youth with disabilities, foster care youth, youth in the juvenile justice system and Asian, Hispanic and other immigrant populations.

young adults received services through youth programs. Of the 1,210 served, 271 of these youth exited with at least one positive reason, such as employment, receiving their diploma or GED, or continuing with advanced education.
